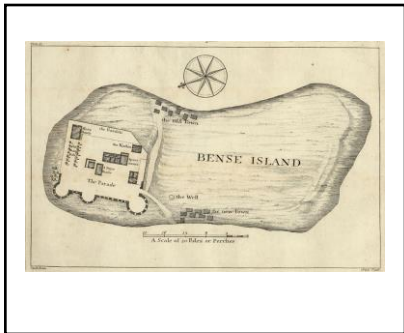

Bunce Island was built as a fortress by the British in _____. In the 17th and 18th centuries it became a major slave trading facility. It was a 'factory' (D. Olusoga) where captured Africans were processed for the system of Transatlantic _____.

'All four companies that managed the fortress were British. The money made there flowed back to British investors. Even the bricks that were used to build the walls of the fortress were fired in Britain and carried to Africa in the bellies of British slave ships... Most of the men whose bones lie crumbling in the European graveyard were British-born and most of the ships that dropped anchor off Bunce island... had set sail from British cities: Bristol, Liverpool, and London.' (D. Olusoga, *Black and British: a Forgotten History*).
